College Day 2013 will be held at the Liberal Arts Campus today, August 23, from 9:00am to 2:00pm, with a first time ever college-wide Luau Luncheon and Aloha Attire Contest in the Hall of Champions Gym, from 11:30am to 1:00pm, at 4901 E. College Day is an annual tradition at LBCC that marks the ceremonial beginning of the academic year when faculty, administrators and staff gather to prepare for the upcoming academic year. Superintendent-President Eloy Oakley, Long Beach Community College District Board President Jeffrey Kellogg and Academic Senate President Phyllis Arias will give remarks to help set the course and tone for the coming 2013-2014 academic year.
